Dear Congressman Abraham, Graves, Higgins, Johnson, Richmond, and Scalise:

On behalf of The Louisiana Department of Health (LDH), Office of Public Health (OPH), I am writing to share our support for the Conrad State 30 and Physician Access Authorization Act (S. 948/H.R.2895). The Office of Public Health has the responsibility to process and recommend J-1 visa waiver requests for participation in the Louisiana Conrad State 30 Program. The United States Department of State (US DOS) and the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) both recognize that letters of support provided by OPH indicate that we are acting as an Interested Government Agency (IGA) for the J-1 visa waiver request application being submitted for approval.

The Office of Public Health is committed to assuring that all Louisiana residents have access to quality affordable health care – the primary purpose of this program is to improve access to primary health care in areas where there is a shortage of physicians, and secondarily, to improve access to needed specialty care. This office recognizes that this is the goal of other similar programs nationwide and that Conrad 30 is an essential recruitment tool of physicians to rural and underserved communities.

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This office currently has twenty-eight (28) individuals in the program, eight (8) applications being reviewed at the DOS, and another one (1) being reviewed internally. This office has the luxury of providing this support at no-cost to the applicant.

The proposed legislation identifies that physicians in the Conrad 30 program nationally have made critical contributions to our countries rural and underserved communities. In Louisiana, we can attest that this program provides rural and underserved areas the ability to fill healthcare positions that otherwise remain vacant. Reauthorization will not only allow states to expand beyond 30 slots which in turn will lessen the burden of the current workforce shortages but also make it permanent. Louisiana will continue to support the Conrad 30 program and know that an expansion will better serve the rural and underserved communities.
