The Act would respond to severe physician & nursing shortages by reserving 15,000 visas for foreign-born physicians and 25,000 visas for foreign-born nurses.

It is important to note that the Act would not create more visas; rather, it would simply reallocate a limited number of unused visas from prior years for physicians and nurses now.

The Act also puts many safeguards in place. The Act would not impact the employment or wages of current American healthcare workers. It requires their employers to provide a letter attesting that the hiring of a foreign national has not and will not displace a U.S. worker.
